

IN MEMORIAM OF OUR FOUNDER: FATHER IAN BOYD, C.S.B.

January 23, 1935 - January 10, 2024



"Human life has all the characteristics of a story. We are characters in a story told by God. Like a novel it has an ordered plot, meaning everything in our lives is significant and providential"—Ian Boyd, C.S.B.

Father Ian Boyd was a priest of the Congregation of Saint Basil.

An internationally recognized Chesterton scholar, he was the Founder and President of the G.K. Chesterton Institute for Faith & Culture and Founding Editor of its journal *The Chesterton Review*. He held these positions from 1974 to 2020. Upon his retirement he was named President Emeritus and Founding Editor.

Father Boyd was the author of *The Novels of G.K. Chesterton* (London 1975). For many years, he was Professor of English at St. Thomas More College, University of Saskatchewan. In 1999 he moved to Seton Hall University where he was until 2019 member of the Department of English at Seton Hall University in South Orange, New Jersey.

In 2022, the Chesterton Institute produced and directed "A Chestertonian Conversation with Father Ian Boyd." a 27-minute documentary. The production is from a 2013 interview with Father Boyd.

About the G. K. CHESTERTON INSTITUTE



The G.K. Chesterton Institute for Faith & Culture, founded in 1974 by Father Ian Boyd, C.S.B., is based at Seton Hall University in South Orange, NJ, where it is a part of the Center for Catholic Studies. The purpose of the Institute is to promote the thought of G. K. Chesterton and his circle and, more broadly, to explore the application of Chestertonian ideas in the contemporary world. The Institute's work consists of conferences, lecture series, research and writing.

The Institute was founded when Father Boyd was at St. Thomas More College in Saskatchewan, Canada. The Institute has been based at Seton Hall University, South Orange, N.J. since 1999. The move of the G.K. Chesterton Institute from Canada to the United States occurred twenty-five years ago, when Monsignor Robert Sheeran, then President of Seton Hall, invited Father Ian Boyd to come to the University.

In July 2020, after 46 years as President of the Institute and Editor of *The Chesterton Review*, Father Boyd retired. Upon his retirement he was named President Emeritus of the Institute and Founding Editor of *The Chesterton Review*. Father Boyd continued to be involved from afar in the work of the Institute until his death in January 2024.

Gloria Garafulich-Grabois is the Director of the Institute and Managing Editor of The *Chesterton Review* and The Lonergan Review-the journal of the Bernard J. Lonergan Institute. Professor Dermot Quinn, became editor of *The Chesterton Review in 2022*.

About FATHER IAN BOYD'S VISION FOR THE INSTITUTE @ 50








"I think in the work like the one we have been carrying out for 50 years at the Chesterton Institute, its effect is what I call cumulative. It builds up slowly, but it builds on its past, and in that way, I think it's Catholic, I think for us Catholics, we do think in terms of the future. We are people, that are Easter people. People of hope turning towards the future. So, this is not an antiquarian cult of Chesterton. We are talking about something immensely relevant for today and tomorrow and for the future. My vision for the Institute has to do with making people aware of what is already present—of what has been going on for 50 years and we hope will continue for another—for a hundred-years into the future. A Catholic university is not just for today, for the moment—it is for all time. I think that Chesterton is being re-discovered everywhere and we are, we can without boasting, we are at the center of that work and it would be of great interest to many people to know that, as I say, the secret of Seton Hall is partly the presence of the Chesterton Institute right here, in our own university. I think the alumni, the Catholic world first of all, and even a larger world of those who read, and those who love Chesterton, that goes beyond, that is an ecumenical dimension. I think we represent that too.

Our Chesterton work is versatile, it deals with themes—particular themes. Chesterton has been there before us, we would like to alert people to the presence of that Chesterton work right here at the university.

We need to startle people that at Seton Hall University, a leading Christian writer for our age finds his home, that he has been here, but his presence has not been well-known, not as well-known as it should be for the people in New Jersey, New York, America itself. We need to find a way to startle people, of surprising them."





This year marks the fiftieth birthday of *The Chesterton Review* – a cause for celebration, if ever there was one. Founded in 1974 in the centenary year of Chesterton's birth, it has been the indispensable instrument for the revived worldwide interest in Chesterton that has been such a feature of the years ever since. Brilliantly edited for most of its half-century by the late Father Ian Boyd, the *Review* has been a vehicle for the best of contemporary Chesterton scholarship and a continuing inspiration for those wishing to understand the genius of an extraordinary man. It has flown the flag for Chesterton's intellectual circle and for other writers in the Christian sacramental tradition, among them Hilaire Belloc, Maurice Baring, and Christopher Dawson. Father Boyd insisted on the highest standards for his journal and, thanks to his efforts and the efforts of those who helped him, *The Chesterton Review* has fulfilled his generous hopes. For fifty years, its pages have been marked by scrupulous scholarship, elegant writing, lively debate, beautiful pictures, and, behind them all, a certain largeness of soul that we might call Chestertonian. It is a towering achievement.

The Chesterton Review now looks forward to another fifty years. There is still a demand for what Chesterton once termed "transcendent common sense." As it begins its second half-century, The Chesterton Review intends to supply it.



The Summit offered a full lineup of interactive approach, the intersection of faith and work from various points of view. Lively discussions followed each workshop.





The G.K. Chesterton Institute is pleased to announce the beginning of a new podcast channel "Speaking about Chesterton." Seven podcasts have been developed so far:

- * The first five episodes correspond to the conversations that took place between Dermot Quinn and Gloria Garafulich-Grabois, under the auspices of the Chesterton Reading Group. Listeners will be able to hear ref lections on the Father Brown Stories, Heretics, Orthodoxy, What II Saw in America and some of Chesterton poems.
- * The sixth podcast is a recording of a conversation between professor Quinn and Mrs. Garafulich-Grabois, entitled "The Adventure of being born," which celebrates the 150th anniversary of the birth of G.K. Chesterton.
- * The seventh podcast is a recording of a dramatized reading of professor James McGlone's evocation of the "Fastidious Friendship of Belloc and Chesterton."

The series will continue in 2025 with further Chestertonian conversations.



"This is the first issue of *The Chesterton Review* to appear since the death in January of its founding editor, Father Ian Boyd. Father Boyd's legacy will be considered in greater detail in our next issue, which will also celebrate, with appropriate gratitude, the fiftieth anniversary of the *Review* itself.

Father Boyd had much looked forward to those celebrations and it is a matter of obvious sadness that he did not live to see them. His absence, though, is a kind of presence—a reminder that, without his extravagant gifts of mind and heart, this journal would never have come into being fifty years ago nor have survived the vicissitudes of the half century since. He wanted it to be marked by scholarly seriousness, elegant writing, lively debate, and astringent humour. For lack of a better world, he wanted *The Chesterton Review* to be Chestertonian. What he got was something more—a periodical that reflected not only Chesterton's personality but his own."



The Chesterton Review turns 50. In May 1974, the centenary year of Chesterton's birth, Father Ian Boyd and a number of other Chestertonians met at a conference at Spode House in England where they conceived of an association and a journal to keep fresh the memory of a great writer. The Chesterton Society was the association, The Chesterton Review the journal. Launched in Canada a few months later, the Review was a nicely produced, modestly proportioned, conspicuously attractive small magazine worthy of its large subject. Now, half a century later, based in the United States, bulkier in vol-ume, equally attractive, unchanged in essential character, it is still going strong, a mon-ument not only to Chesterton but also to the founding vision of fifty years ago. It is also a monument (should you require it) to Father Boyd. If anyone cares to buy a cake and festoon it with enough candles to light a large room, let me be the first to applaud. Joy is the gigantic secret of the Christian, Chesterton noticed in Orthodoxy. This is a genu-inely joyful occasion.

So, we celebrate a birthday. "The first fact about the celebration of a birthday is that it is a way of affirming defiantly, and event flamboyantly, that it is a good thing to be alive." In a modest way, the fiftieth anniversary issue of the Review offers itself in a sim-ilar spirit of defiant affirmation. Father Ian Boyd conceived of this journal fifty years ago, little knowing how it would turn out but convinced of its importance as a vehicle for scholarly conversation and cultural renewal. Since then, it has more than made good on its early promise. He would be pleased, I think, that *The Chesterton Review* has not forgotten the "supreme adventure" of its own birth.
